SRIYANTRA



Sriyantra blesses every time one looks at it!

The Sri Yantra is not just a visual object; it is a meditative tool that guides the practitioner towards self-realization and the experience of ultimate reality.

SRIYANTRA

This meticulously crafted painting of the Sri Yantra, a sacred geometric revered symbol is associated with divine energy and the cosmos. The painting is a vivid tapestry of shapes, colors, and intricate patterns that draw you into a journey of spiritual exploration and self-discovery.

The Center: Bindu

'Bindu', a small red dot at center symbolizes the unity of the universe and the source of creation. It signifies the pure consciousness and ultimate reality from which all existence emanates.

Surrounding the Bindu: Inner Triangles

Nine interlocking triangles, Four point upwards, represent Shiva (the masculine principle), and five point downwards, symbolize Shakti (the feminine principle). Together, they form 43 smaller triangles, representing the cosmos and the human body.

The Lotus Petals: Ashtadal and Shodashadal Padma

Surrounding the triangles are two concentric rings of lotus petals- The inner ring has eight petals (Ashtadal Padma), and the outer ring has sixteen petals (Shodashadal Padma) which symbolize purity, spiritual awakening, and the unfolding of consciousness.

The Squares: Bhupura

Encasing the entire structure is the 'Bhupura', a square with four gates, symbolizing the earth and the material realm. The gates, represent the cardinal directions and the threshold between the physical world and the spiritual dimensions.

Symbolic Interpretation

The Sri Yantra encapsulates the profound philosophy that the macrocosm (the universe) and the microcosm (the individual self) are reflections of each other. Engaging with the painting invites a deeper understanding of the interconnectedness of all things and the path towards spiritual enlightenment.

- The use of traditional kolam elements within a structured square reflects a blend of heritage and contemporary art. It honors the cultural significance of kolam while presenting it in a new, modern context.

- The symmetrical patterns and the harmonious color palette convey a sense of balance, peace, and order, reflecting the meditative and spiritual aspects of Kolam.

Wealth and Purity:
